


School of Applied Studies


to get into the energy of the game with a spirit as strong as their muscle, was the defining essence of this league of collegians we were proud to call our own.




Determination and Talent



Making Their Mark

It is expected that with each passing year a newly-developed program will improve, but NNU's Women's Soccer Team has made remarkable improvements. Last year the team struggled through many serious injuries and a limited roster. This year, however, the team grew substancially, adding eight talented freshmen to the program. After two weeks of training the girls went to California, beginning at Point Loma Nazarene University in San Diego. "The California trip was one of the most fun parts of the whole season. We were able to do things together outside of playing soccer, like going to a Padres' game and visiting Sea World," said goalkeeper Shemia Fagan. "We really became close during those 10 days." The Lady Crusaders faced some of the toughest competition in the NAIA on the trip, playing Azusa Pacific University, the defending national champion, and Westmont College, the third ranked team in the nation. Sophomore Jamie Swanson stated, "Those teams were nothing spectacular; we were just a new team that wasn't used to playing together yet. If we were to play them now, the outcome would be much different."

Despite the girls' rough start, they pulled together and became a dynamic team that was a definite threat to other teams in the Cascade Conference. For the first time in NNU Women's Soccer history, the team defeated Concordia University--twice. The first match was held on Concordia's home field and resulted in a 3-1 win. "We knew that we could beat them; we knew we had it in us if we came out with confidence and played our best, and we did," remarks Captain Melanie Hays. "We beat them a second time to prove to them that it was no coincidence." The girls finished

the season with a final conference record of 7-2-1, losing only to Western Baptist College. The ladies chose an excellent year to step up and to remarkably improve their game, as the school changed to university status. "Next year we plan to be even better," says Junior Captain Denise Thuline. Women's soccer moves up to NCAA Division II next year, with even tougher competition. Such a challenge could only mean a bright future ahead and games even more enjoyable to watch.


The NNU men's soccer team entered the 1999 season with high expectations after earning a playoff bid in 1998. However, the 'Saders fell short of their goals, with early season setbacks diminishing their long-term cause. The team began in Colorado, playing Colorado School of Mines and Montana State-Billings. While several games that could have been won by NNU were not, the team polished its skills and proved itself a force to be contended with.

The team gradually adjusted to the large number of newcomers--both transfers and freshmen--and fused their playing styles into a composite winning form. With only two seniors on the squad, the young and talented team learned many lessons that would assist them in the future.

The new additions contributed greatly, and with four freshmen starters, the 'Saders ended the season on a three game winning streak, boosting their record to 4-6 in conference play. "We had a disappointing start to the season and some games in the middle that could have really boosted our confidence, if a bounce here and a referee's call there had went our way. Things started clicking at the end, but it was too late by then," reflected junior Trevor Stoneberg. Despite missing out on the playoffs by one game, three first-team and one second-team all-conference selections were made from NNU.

With a young squad gaining a valuable year of experience, the members established themselves as ones to

watch out for in the year 2000. NNU played attractive soccer throughout the season, even when results did not fare in their favor. In spite of graduating two key position players, keeper Jeremy Klosterman and sweeper Jeremy Keating, the team displayed the potential to be competing in post season play for a long time to come.






Junior Scott Strobel leads the Crusader attack during their match against Albertson's. Strobel helped anchor the NNU midfield in 1999.


Earning Early Recognition

True Love of the Game



Determined to Be the Best


The Lady Crusader basketball team posted yet another banner year in the last season under the reigns of Coach Roger Schmidt. Entering the season as the number five ranked team in NAIA Division II, the Lady 'Saders entertained the fans of Montgomery Fieldhouse all winter long.

During the Saders preseason, the girls had a mark of 10-4, and the team did not lose a game again until the semifinals of the NAIA Division II National Tournament. The twenty-three game winning streak saw NNU climb as high as the number two spot in the national poll. Included in that winning streak was a 14-0 record in the Cascade Conference, making the Lady Crusaders the first team to go undefeated in the Cascade Conference since Western Oregon did it in the 1980-81 season by a record of 8-0.

Heading into the national tournament in Sioux City, Iowa, NNU was the number three seed. Victories over Menlo, Midland Lutheran, and Dakota State earned the Lady Saders a semifinal game against the fifteenth-seeded University of Mary. Unfortunately, the 23-game winning streak would be snapped in that game, ending NNU's run into the history books. But NNU didn't have anything to be ashamed of with a perfect conference record and with the records made by team players. Jessica Knowlton became number three in all-time assists

at NNU and Staci Kirk-Carter led in career games played, had the most three-pointers, and was the school's all-time leading scorer.

"We had an awesome run. It was disappointing to see it come to an end when we were so close to a national championship, but we'll be back," commented junior Mary Glaze. The ladies plan on picking up where they left off this year and working towards another excellent season. The Lady Crusaders finished their dynamic season with an overall record of 33-5.







Pressuring the Competition

The 1999-2000 version of the Northwest Nazarene University basketball team was supposed to reverse the disappointing season that the program had last year. A blazing start to the season by the Crusaders made it appear as though their campaign was going to be a prosperous one. Unfortunately, due to injuries to key players and a difficult non-conference schedule, Coach Rich Sanders' team fell to a 13-19 overall record and 7-9 in the Cascade Conference.

The Crusaders' season began with four straight victories, highlighted by the US Bank/Shilo Inns Tip-Off Tournament title victory over rival Albertson College of Idaho. The hot start earned NNU a number five ranking in the NAIA Division II poll. However, the Crusaders dropped eleven of their next twelve contests. "We played a lot of tough schools in November and December and a lot of them were on the road. Between the higher competition and the extensive travel, it wore on us a lot coming into the conference season," remarked senior Jeremy Stockett. Games included in that twelve-game span consisted of losses to NCAA semifinalists Seattle Pacific University and NCAA Division II champions Metro State.

The Crusaders' rocky season continued into Cascade Conference play, where they posted a 7-9 record, finishing seventh place in the league and earning a post-season match-up with ACI. Despite defeating Albertson the previous












Nate Roskam makes contact with the ball and earns a double. Intramural softball popularity soared again in the spring.







The new beginning for track and field also gave a chance for current NNU students to participate again in a sport that they excelled at in high school.


"It was nice to be out and competing again," commented junior Jimmy Bennum. "I missed being on a team and representing something much larger than yourself. It felt good to be out there again."

















into the expanse


