When they were ready to leave, all equipment was cleaned and put away. Throughout the day they were courteous to Rob, me and the children.

Although I'm sure that the pledges were pushed to perform manual labor as hard as they've ever done, I was pleased to see that

the other member shirked no task no matter how menial or dirty. I'm sure that all of Circle K—pledges

and regular member alike—were exhausted when they left. I was

pleasantly surprised to see them at first service of First Church the next morning.

We have had several neighbors and relatives come over and com-

pliment the results of Circle K's work. They all expressed amazement that a group of young men

could work so hard and accomplishment so much, especially without monetary gain. Their work has

really been a witness of the Lord's goodness to many of the non-believers in our neighborhood.

The Bible says that the Lord will provide for your needs before you even ask and He certainly did so through the outstanding job these young men did. It makes us so

grateful to be associated with a Christian college like Trevecca and to know people like the Circle

K members. They are a clear example to all Christians of how we need to serve others. If the members are agreeable, I really wish you would mail a copy of this letter to their parents. As parents, Rob and I can only hope that Jennifer and Tristan will learn to be as caring and responsible as the members of Circle K.
