Astronomer Speaks To Students at Tuesday Lyceum

Looking far beyond the moon into outer space, the students of N.N.C. learned what the telescope shows in the sky they see every night when Harry G. Johnson of the Brown Foundation delivered an illustrated American Sky lecture in the college auditorium Tuesday. November 19, 1946, at 8:00 p. m.

As much of the metropoliton planteria benefits as possible were provided by means of electrical demonstration apparatus on the stage and by the visual story of today's knowledge of the sky as told by the related series of actual, unretouched photographs projected on the screen.

By the aid of the illuminated "orbits," Mr. Johnson explained the motions of the sun, the moon and the earth. The sunsetter, the electric finger, the sky window and a control desk or nerve center were other stage apparatus he used to explain the plantetarium system.

The audience viewed the earth form distant space and our sun. Shown also were the thousands of other universes, clusters of conspicuous stars and then nebula and closeups of the mountains on the moon. They were shown that the earth has craters and lavas like the moon's and were taught an easy way to learn the stars.

In a few minutes time, the American Sky lecture brought a sweeping understandable panorama of discoveries in the universe and star spectacles of the centuries.



It's been two thanksgivings since the war and how many more until another is for God to know and for us to find out by the method of experience. You say it's trite to date from a Thursday in November and maybe it is but since November 1941 it became, "Join Now" and inevitably "We Regret to Inform

Thanksgiving of '41 we still had tires on our cars and did just about what we pleased. A few "radical" statemen, commentators and Lindberg's warned us that it was time for preparation but they were Communists or war mongers. We were careful to write "taboo" across their

Thanksgiving of '42 reminded the nation, including N. N. C., that we were in for a long seige of war. More people were in church on that day than ever before "Praying in a pinch" but better than if they offered no word to God.

Thanksgiving of '43, plenty of American college students were sweating it out on the front and in Japanese and German concentration camps. N. N. C.'s enrollment showed a decrease in fellows with the feminine population outnumbering them three to one.

Thanksgiving of '44 was a time of crisis. That month many homes hung out the gold star or stars and N. N. C. had some on its service chart. Municipal honor rolls were growing increasingly longer and recruiting offices shot their monthly quota higher than ever before. Countries the world over were tightening their belts and U.S. civilians quit growling about not being able to get nylons and kleenex. German rockets and the foreboding of coming Atomic power kept everyone at his post of duty.

Ma Perkins and the General Mills hour sent their sons to war and in between Wheaties, Bisquick and Oxydol, reminded the homefolks to save fats, use sugar substitutes, buy bonds and pinch their pennies. Nobody did the latter and living costs rose rapidly.

Thanksgiving '45 and the service branches were demobilizing. We were plenty glad to take the blue stars out of the windows. OPA held
