



To Charlie Sands, Tish's charming young nephew, falls a lot of rescuing his well-meaning but often impetuous aunt. George Ortin plays the role of Charlie. Among those who come in contact with the dynamic Tish are Ellen Lughton, portrayed by Anne Knapp, owner and operator of the Eagle Hotel, and her loyal and courageous little friend, Callie Hopkins, done by Marva Lund; also meeting her, but not faring so well, is Luther Hopkins, Callie's hardheaded and hardhearted father, played by Bob Cantonwine.

Others are Bettina Trent, Pat Nichol, a most unhappy girl, Wesley Andrews, Donald Doane, an engaging young man, Denby Grimes, a picture magazine photographer, done by Dave Mitchell, and Dorice Gaylord, an affected model, played by Shirley Tindall.

Coming in for their share of laughs are Lem Pike, a typical boastful and romantic, at least in his own mind, sheriff; and Charita, Ruth DeWater, Ellen Lughton's Mexican maid servant.

Directors, Shirley Tindall and Clayton Martin, feel that the characters are well cast and that there is a high degree of enthusiasm and cooperation.

## Think You Are Working Too Hard?

AMES, IOWA - (ACP) - There aren't as many people actually working as you may have thought. At least, not according to this survey included in the Iowa State Daily:

"The population of the country is over 160 million, but there are 62 million over 60 years of age, leaving 98 million to do the work. People under 21 total 54 million which leaves 44 million to do the work.

Then there are 21 million who are employed by the Government and that leaves 23 million to do the work. Ten million are in the armed forces, leaving 13 million to do the work. Deduct 12,800,000, the number in state and city offices, and that leaves 200 thousand to do the work. There are 126 thousand in hospitals, insane asylums and so forth and that leaves 74 thousand people to do the work.

But 62 thousand of these are bums or others who will not work so that leaves 12 thousand to do the work.

Now it may interest you to know that there are 11,998 people in jail, so that leaves just two people to do all the work. And that is you and me, brother, and I'm getting tired doing everything by myself.

Competing at the Bronco stadium last Saturday the NNC thin-clads gained a total of 65 points to top both BJC and C of I. The Boise Broncos had 55 points while the C of I team had an unimpressive 22 points.

Don Constable and John Finkbeiner proved to be the heart of the NNC attack. Constable turned in three first places by taking the high hurdles, low hurdles, and 220 yard dash. His 25.6 clocking the lows was a new NNC record.

Finkbeiner did the 880 yard run in 2:04 and also took the quarter with a 51.1 time. Harry Maine, NNC distance runner took both the one and two-mile races. The three fellows, Constable, Finkbeiner, and Maine, accounted for better than half of the Crusader points.

NNC also took a first place in the mile baton battle.


