Choose Christ, Not Perfectionism

Life is a circle. Each moment we are traveling around this circle stopping at various points to experience. We learnat these points; sometimes we are hurt and other times we experience utter and total happiness. Tears are shared. Laughs echo through time. We all make mistakes. At times, one mistake in one area is enough to allow us to never make that mistake again. At other times we have to go around the circle several times before we learn and change. The final outcome depends on our willingness to want to better ourselves. The fact still remains that <u>no one</u> is perfect. I feel that often the term "Christianity" is linked with the term "perfect." There should be no parallelism between the two. A Christian's goal should be to strive to do the best they can and be the best person they can be.

"So," you might say, "what does that mean?" It's difficult to actually define a Christian. I believe a Christian is a person saved by the grace of God, accepting Him as their personal Savior who died for all man's sins. Still, that leaves a lot of room for discussion. I can tell you that I would not coin a person "non-Christian" for such reasons as drinking, dancing, or smoking. That does not mean, either, that I conform to the worldly idea that these things are right. I feel that a person will accept Jesus first, then He will convict them on points in their life that need to be changed or that a better attitude need to be created about. You cannot begin with a type and mold an individual to that type, but rather begin with an individual and show the individual the type. Sometimes when witnessing it seems hard to make Christianity attractive. The reason for that, I believe, is that we tend to focus on the so-called "bad" points such as those I mentioned above; not condoning to drinking, dancing and smoking. Not doing those things are not strict rules of Christianity itself, but we must remember that we ourselves "are God's temple" and that God's spirit lives within us. If we destroy God's temple, God will destroy us; "For God's temple is sacred," and we are that temple (I Corinthians 3:16-17, NIV). When we realize this, that our bodies are God's temple, and respect this, we will do everything in moderation as it benefits God. Not doing or doing certain things comes with personal convictions and maturity in Christ.

Christianity involves service to fellow man, compassion, caring, love, commitment, and I feel, one of the most important aspects, a willingness to help out in any given situation without having to be rewarded or recognized. Too many times a service is rendered only for praise. "Be careful not to do your 'acts of righteousness' before men, to be seen by them. If you do, you will have no reward from your Father in heaven" (Matthew 5:45, NIV). Christianity sometimes means working behind the scenes out of the limelight.

I'm not an expert on Christianity, but I do know what I see. I see people searching and searching for something <u>real</u> to hold on to. Something to make life worth living in a world that seems to get worse each day. It took me quite some time to admit it to myself, but Jesus is the <u>only</u> answer. Perfection is not. Mistakes are inevitable. I see too many people playing the part of Christians on campuses or in church. Hypocrisy will get you no where fast. Hypocrisy demands disrespect and creates distrust. Too many are searching for the perfect life instead of the Christ filled life.

My suggestion? Relax. Accept Christ. Take one day at a time, and remember; no one ever said it would be easy. Live your life as a spirit-filled Christian and your walk will vindicate you life. Your own concepts of right and wrong and the true meaning of Christianity will come as you mature in your walk with God. Life is a circle. Experience, think, learn from your mistakes and avoid the idea of perfectionism.

He reminisced and as he did he talked about some values he took with him from NNC. One of these was his attempt to answer the question wrapped up in the school motto, "Seek first the kingdom of God." We talked together and commented that it would be good if that question could be only partially answered for the rest of our lives.
